#### **Design Charrettes Bring Results**

At the 2010 Upper Mississippi River Conference, the cities of Davenport, Buffalo, and Keithsburg presented current projects they were working on in order to have the participants assist in brainstorming ideas and solutions. We asked each for an update.

Davenport's Levee Commission incorporated all of the UMRC designs into its phased East Industrial Park. The City Council will soon be asked to approve phase one, the landscape improvements and pavilion on the west end of the site. Naming the park as well as designing a pedestrian bridge across River Drive and park entrances are next.

Buffalo energized its citizens to form a Mississippi River Trail Committee and then launched a public/private fundraising campaign for engineering its seven miles of riverfront. It hopes to have a match (\$115,000) for a DOT grant by April, 2011.

Ketihsburg, has identified a marina developer and received permits while seeking federal funding for 87 slips, gas dock, and boat repair facility that would compliment the town's campground, and two boat ramps. Leaders say the development is key to recovery efforts as they still suffer from the aftermath of the 1993 and 2008 floods.

### **QC Wild Places**

With input from the Upper Mississippi River Grant Writers Partnership, River Action has envisioned the development of a multicounty cooperative partnership to establish the "QC Wild Places." This project will emulate the exceptionally successful Chicago Wilderness (see www.chicagowilderness.org) and advocate awareness and conservation of the diversity of natural areas within the five-county region of Muscatine and Scott in Iowa and Rock Island, Henry, and Mercer in Illinois. These counties define a region of dozens of protected natural areas encompassing more than 16,000 acres, each of which is within approximately one hour driving time from the Quad City metro area. In cooperation with public and private land managers, OC Wild Places will promote and support these natural areas, financially and otherwise, in order to better connect people to these resources and cultivate a culture of stewardship. QC Wild Places will also function as a coalition to create a comprehensive natural area plan that aims to coordinate conservation efforts and promote ecological corridor development throughout the five-county region. The first meeting of major stakeholders will take place on Friday, January 21st.

#### "One Watershed" Airing on WQAD TV 8

With the support of Alcoa, River Action launched on January 9, 2011, a 13 week series on what is being done to improve water quality in the Mississippi River watershed. The first episodes featured Mercer County farmers using best management practices to avoid soil erosion and runoff on tillable acres. No till farming, runoff from hog containment lots, precision farming as well as bio-retention cells, green roofs, permeable paying and stream bank restoration used in cities and by homeowners are subjects of upcoming episodes. They can be viewed Sunday, 10 p.m. news, and Monday, a.m. news. Many thanks to Rock Island County Farm Bureau, Scott County Farm Bureau, City of Davenport, City of Rock Island, and John Deere for assistance. One Watershed's second series will air this fall.

#### **Citizen Power Gets Canal Restoration Underway**

The Hennepin Canal Parkway has been a destination for cyclists, hikers, birders, fisherman, cross-country skiers, and snowmobilers for decades. We may be able to add paddlers to that list in the near future. Friends of Hennepin Canal and the IL D.N.R. are taking on a "Renaissance Project" that will restore three locks and reopen 50 miles of the canal making it an exceptional water trail from Rock Falls to Colona.

The Hennepin Canal State Parkway boasts one million annual visitors. The Renaissance Project hopes that lock and accessibility improvements will encourage boat & bike outfitters to offer equipment rentals and possibly a canal boat tour business in the future.

Earlier lock restoration efforts have improved this section of the canal, but there are many hurdles that remain. Each lock will cost between \$350,000 and \$650,000 to repair. Friends of Hennepin Canal are currently trying to

raise \$80,000 by May through charitable donations and grants for an engineering study.

The Hennepin Canal is more than just a place for fun. It played a very important role in the history of the United States, its industry, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Construction finally got under way in 1892 and the first boat went through in 1907.

However, during construction of the canal, the Corps of Engineers widened the locks on the Illinois and Mississippi Rivers making the canal obsolete before construction even finished.

#### River Action's Youth Advisory Board Update

The Youth Advisory Board will don outdoor gear and model it at a fashion show, May 13, at Fish & Fire. Apparel is from Active Endeavors, a sponsor of the dinner.

In addition, the Board is currently discussing a possible youth summit to take place on one of the nights at the Upper Mississippi River Conference. We hope to bring young people into the conference and allow them to contribute to the solutions being posited by the professionals at the conference. It will also be an opportunity to get up to date on issues facing the Mississippi River and its communities. Some of the issues being discussed include: the tangible outcomes of the summit what those will be, the geographic range, and the ages of participants.

## TRAILS UPDATE

**Bettendorf** - The project that will connect Duck Creek Trail to the Iowa MRT at the Isle of Capri is scheduled to go out for bid in Mid-Feb. Steve Grimes, Parks Director, hopes the city will award the contract and start construction late March/April and complete the project by the end of summer. Bettendorf also received a National Scenic Byways Grant to construct an overlook and that will go out to bid in April. It will include signage, viewing binoculars, interpretive signage, parking, and a restroom near Riverstone at Elm Street. Over \$2 million grant dollars overall for these projects have been received.

**Buffalo** - The city is considering funding options to secure the \$115,000 match needed for a \$500,000 federal earmark for engineering by March. Two pancake breakfasts have been held to create awareness of the 10 mile trail from Utah St. to Wild Cat Den State Park. A deposit account has been set up at Buffalo Savings Bank to help fund the public/private partnership [\$915 has been raised in donations so far]. 
**Davenport** - The redesigned Credit Island Bridge will go out for bid in Mid-Feb to be administered by the Iowa DOT. The base bid for the project is a 14' X 800' bridge from Credit Island Park to South Concord Street. The city hopes to complete construction in Summer 2011.

**Princeton to Bettendorf** – The Trail Committee expects a final report this month from Stanley Consultants on the alignment and construction costs. The report will be used to apply for grants to construct the 16 mile trail.

**Riverdale** – Construction Engineering was completed in 2010 by Townsend Engineering on the 1.3 mile trail along the Alcoa property. Easements with Mid American Energy and the railroad are currently being negotiated so that the city can apply for construction funds in 2011. The city has already set aside matching funds for constructing the trail.

**Clinton/Camanche** – Clinton and Camanche received a \$2.2M earmark five years ago for a trail to connect the communities. The cities secured the 20% match necessary for the 4 mile trail that will connect their riverfronts. The cities hope construction is finished in the fall of 2011.

**Muscatine** – Muscatine has awarded a contract for construction of the trail from Weed Park to Wild Cat Den in 2011. The city of Muscatine will work with the City of Buffalo to develop a trail from Wild Cat Den, through Buffalo and into Davenport via Concord Street. Muscatine is also working on establishing a route for the southern portion of the MRT that will extend the MRT to Louisa County and hopes to submit a concept statement for the southern portion to the lowa DOT by May 2011.

# Interview with New IA DNR Director, Roger Lande

We recently asked Roger Lande, Muscatine, about his goals for Iowa DNR.

#### RA: What do you hope to do as DNR Director?

Lande: "I hope to have an open, responsive, and receptive department. Quite simply, there is always a natural tension between regulators and the regulated, but I believe we can be known as a customer friendly department."

#### RA: What is the biggest challenge facing the Mississippi River.

**Lande**: "I am concerned about all the rivers and streams that feed the Mississippi and their solutions for flood control and water pollution. The Mississippi is cleaner than it was 25 years ago, but at the same time, we have lost 2% of our topsoil."

# RA: What do citizens and communities have to do to meet these goals?

**Lande**: "They have to recognize there are real problems out there to solve. The stream that runs by each of us must be cleaner. While difficult, we must improve all of them."

Lande addressed funding as well. He recently heard projections from the governor's office, the legislature's finance office, and the state auditor's office, and while spending more money to maintain services with fewer funds is challenging, it was encouraging to have the departments collaborating. It is particularly difficult at a time when fees, "which the department lives on", are lower because more companies are in compliance with air quality standards and paying fewer fees. A good news-bad news thing.

# Greenvalley Nature Preserve, River Action, and Kiwanis Club

In early 2010, River Action received funding from the EPA to conduct wetland and stream restoration work at the Greenvalley Nature Preserve. Planning is underway for project implementation in 2011 and, when complete, it will be among the first projects to enact recommendations made in the "Rock River Ravines Watershed Plan," a document produced through a multi-partner effort lead by River Action in 2008.

Over the next two years, River Action is committing additional funds to the Greenvalley restoration effort as part of its "RiverWay: A Partnership" budget. These funds will support the EPA project and be used to enhance existing infrastructure, develop self-guided educational facilities, create recreational trails, and expand ecological restoration efforts. From 2011 to 2012, River Action hopes to raise \$145,000 in addition to the \$82,500 already allocated to the EPA project.

River Action is also pursuing additional project partners. The Kiwanis Bike trail runs through the Greenvalley Nature Preserve and River Action has approached the club to partner with us on trail renovations and other project elements, including the construction of nature trails, benches, and boardwalks through the wetlands. We presented our project at the Kiwanis Club's January 11th meeting and received notable praise. We will seek commitment from the club as soon as we can present them with a formal proposal.
